

Each year Christians gather in worship to remember the days when Jesus came to Jerusalem just before his death on the cross and his resurrection to new life. Our worship today unfolds the story of that awesome and awful week. We welcome you to enter into our worship as if you were there. Imagine the hills around Jerusalem and all the roads leading up to the Holy City crowded with pilgrims coming for the feast of the Passover. His triumphant entry was a fulfillment of Zechariah's ancient prophecy.

Zechariah 9:9-10

Rejoice greatly, O daughter Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter Jerusalem! Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. He will cut off the chariot from Ephraim and the warhorse from Jerusalem; and the battle-bow shall be cut off, and he shall command peace to the nations; his dominion shall be from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth.

The Blessing of the Palms

Celebrant

Since the fourth century, Christians have been remembering the day Jesus rode into Jerusalem to shouts of joyful praise. The palm branch was a sign that you had made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, and to honor this day, people cut branches from their yards to join in a triumphant procession, even when they lived far away or in a different age. In the ninth century, a Christian wrote a song, which we sing to this day. We bless these branches of palm and raise them high to show that Jesus is our King, as we sing, "All glory, laud, and honor."

Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. *Amen*.

Luke 19:28-40

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

After telling a parable to the crowd at Jericho, Jesus went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it." So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."



All are welcome to receive the sacrament of Christ or a blessing. Come up the center aisle and take your place along the altar rail, kneeling or standing. If you desire a blessing, cross your arms over your chest to indicate your intent. Receive the host in open hands. Gluten-free host is available; let the clergy know your need when they approach you. When you are presented with the cup, drink from it or dip the bread carefully into the cup and consume in both kinds together. If you do not wish to receive the cup, please cross your arms to indicate your intent, but wait for the minister to pass you before you leave the rail. Please use the side aisle to return to your pew. If you are unable to come forward, ask an usher to let the clergy know, and communion will be brought to you.

TODAY IS PALM SUNDAY

On this day, the church remembers when Jesus entered Jerusalem, cheered by those who hoped for the restoration of God's kingdom. This whole story is called the Passion of our Lord, for its message is of his suffering, which offers us redemption from sin and death and gives new life in resurrection joy.
